## Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk Do No Harm -- Do Good -- Stay in Love with God -John Wesley

Rather early in my ministry, I was exposed a book that describes the Three Simple Rules of John Wesley for living in this world as a Christian Disciple. The book was written by Bishop Ruben P. Job and is titled, Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living. Bishop Job took the principles left in the writings of John Wesley and places them in the context of a modern world that often bases rules on personal preferences.

These three simple rules are Do No Harm, Do Good, and Stay in Love with God. They certainly sound simple in their presentation. But there is great depth to what Wesley suggests for those who would to be committed Disciples of Jesus Christ. Wesley's rules were developed over a lifetime of scripture study, church experience and tradition, and his ability to apply human reason to the teachings of Jesus.

The first is listed first for a reason. We often find ourselves in conflict with others due to our lack of consideration of living in this world while doing no harm to others. Though he lived his life in a different world than any of us would recognize today, Wesley believed this rule should apply to all areas of God's creation. He encourages us to do no harm to our fellow humanity, including the ways that we impact the rest of creation by our choices. In some cases, this includes the fallout of choices we make today that may impact others in the future.

The example of Job relates the story of our purchasing a pair of the most popular tennis shoes for one of our children. After making our purchase, we then discover the actual manufacture of those shoes happens in a foreign country makes use of child labor that takes advantage of cultural need. We are encouraged to consider how our actions in life in what is perhaps the most developed country in the world impacts areas of the world that only dream of such development.

Job goes on to encourage us to understand how our actions now have an almost invisible impact on those whom we don't know. A current example could be those persons who declare it is their freedom to refuse to wear a facial mask during our current pandemic. It is true that we live in a free society. Our forefathers and mothers fought valiantly for us to live freely. Wesley's call to "Do No Harm" invites us to consider how our exposure to this virus may not impact our life much.

We may be among the fortunate who do not respond in ways that put life at risk, for us. However, what about the family who lives next door to a friend of ours who also celebrates the right to freely live mask free? What if the virus is passed on by a friend, who passes it to a friend, who shares it with a family, who unknowingly exposes a beloved grandparent to the deadly effects of this virus? It is simple from Wesley's point of view. Do NO Harm!

Therefore, as a follower of Wesley's teachings and a member of the United Methodist community of faith, we encourage everyone to "Do No Harm" by wearing a mask in public, maintain social distancing, and wash your hands often. Wesley understood the teachings of Jesus and for him, it really is all about Jesus!


